In developing performance and understanding, pre-service teachers are positioned to learn to teach through performance—contrasted with an "old-school" belief that one must first spend much time tediously trying to understand how things work before playing the instruments. In Foundations, topics are situated in big picture contexts, calling attention to the broad applicability of information across instruments.
